






Jubilee! Celebrating Closer to Home









On October 28, 2023, the HTI board members gathered with more than four hundred of their closest friends at the Country Music Hall of Fame to celebrate the birthday of a mission born fifty years ago. Indeed, it was quite a celebration, one worthy of the Music City on a Saturday night.

The blowout was spectacular, and the venue exceeded expectations. In true Nashville style, guests were greeted at the door by a medley of live music, having bluegrass and mariachi bands competing for their attention. During the mocktail hour, we greeted old friends and made new ones. Many of us perused the silent auction where Guatemalan artwork, jewelry, and crafts were on display. Soon, guests were summoned to the main hall for dinner and presentations.

An auctioneer entertained the crowd by creating bidding wars between SEC rivals for team bracelets. Who knew that a Vols fan would donate \$125 for an orange good luck charm? (It doesn't work, in case you're wondering). The showcase of the evening was provided by Dr. Strawther who donated his mother's diamond solitaire for bidding...a huge success.

The festivities were well deserved, but if you weren't there, you might be wondering WHY we celebrated so enthusiastically. By anyone's standards, reaching fifty is a significant milestone and cause for reflection. In an era when half of all nonprofits fail in the first twelve months (according to Forbes), surviving fifty years is a big deal. And HTI isn't merely surviving. We are flourishing by any standard. More people are now involved than ever. You'll find the financials included elsewhere—the numbers speak for themselves. The organization is healthy both stateside and in-country. HTI is achieving its mission of spreading the good news through medical evangelism, and it's gaining momentum through a network of churches and supporters like you who are faithful to the cause.

There's also something special about the number fifty, specifically for believers. You might recall in Leviticus that Jubilee was celebrated every fifty years. Property rights were reverted to the original owners, slaves were freed, and the fields were allowed to rest. In the New Testament, the word Pentecost comes from the Greek word for fiftieth. Also known as the Feast of Weeks or Firstfruits, it took place fifty days after Passover, when God poured out his Spirit on his people as a sampling of the first fruits of the resurrection waiting for us in full. So in the first instance, the people offered their first fruits to God, and in the second, Jesus offered his first fruits to us. If that's not reason for Christians to celebrate, I'm not sure what is.

So there's no need to feel guilty for partying. In fact, we are commanded to do so. In Hebrew, Jubilee literally means "the blast of a trumpet". It was great seeing everyone there. And if you missed out, well, you did. But there is still hope. You can celebrate with us next time. We look forward to seeing you soon! **Stephen Harvey, MD**

Thomas Kincade is known as the painter of light... seventeen on our November Eye team are the *deliverers of vision*; and were very excited about the prospect of a week of eye surgeries and the many patients who would walk through the door.

Upon arrival, we were met by a dozen or so patients with stories to tell and lives to live. As the blind man told Jesus in Luke 18, "I want to see."

After unloading and getting settled in, we were off to the races to get everything done to prepare for the next day; we had vision to deliver and a God to glorify!

Sunday was the typical church experience, meeting with Dr. Walter, and then a quick lunch before beginning our surgeries with the first fourteen patients. Everything went well and by the end of the day, we were all ready for a good rest, anxious to learn of the surgical results in the morning and to hear these patients praise the giver of life.

Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday meant getting up early, grabbing that first cup of hot coffee, then checking on patients from the day before. There were more older patients this week than usual; this made for difficult and sometimes time-consuming operations. What made a huge difference were the new surgical scopes that were purchased and delivered since our last eye trip. These new machines were fantastic and worked well for the surgeons. There were several occasions where they made comments about how good they were and how easy they worked.

Thursday evening, we celebrated our last day by enjoying some Choco-bananas and passing the mic to tell a quick story about our favorite moments during the week. Everyone had stories to tell.

Overall, the trip was an enormous success. Eighty-seven patients received sight during the week, and all were treated with the love of Christ, many for the very first time. It was a wonderful group of people to work with and all were very excited and already discussing their return in 2024. **Bode Teague**
