They covered us in prayer, and we covered them. We laughed, loved, lived and served. And before the week was over, a few tears were shed!

Dentists Carson Henley and Bob Huffstutter were rock stars, and our dental team was thrilled to see Dr. 'Baawb' return, you see he enjoys celebrity status. One lady had eleven root canals in a single day. That will wear out anyone, yet Bob will tell you that ours is the happiest dental clinic in the world. (We did not ask the record setting root canal patient how happy she was.)

Elizabeth and Trey O'Brien, occupational and physical therapists made their first trip with us, and brought their two precious daughters, Sarah and Isabelle. The Colemans, O'Briens and Shipps are all from Mississippi, so the slow, southern, melodious drawls echoed through the OR and exam rooms. Ya'll was heard almost as often as gracias!



It didn't take long for Guatemala to leave a mark on the O'Brien's hearts. The observed sweet Griselda being carried on her mother's back to receive physical therapy care for a dislocated hip.

Tender, calming care provided relief to Griselda and joy to her mother who wanted nothing more than what is best for her daughter.



For the O'Brien's she is a patient they will never forget, this is a trip that 'just means more.'

Within a few days, Griselda received a customized wheelchair, complete with a harness to keep her



safe and secure when unable to control her movements.

Our physicians and dentists, Drs. Coleman, Henley, Huffstutter and Shipp were wonderful teachers. Predental students spent hours being mentored and inspired, and certainly the aid of the students in the OR was critical to our being able to care for so many patients. They functioned as second assistants in surgery, prepped patients beforehand and transported them to and from the OR with the fabulous Ms. Rita directing traffic.

Houston Schoonmaker, only a few years removed from being an ACU student on a Health Talents trip, was able to lead by example and encourage students to return once they were into their careers. Giving, giving back and loving every minute!

Cary Sills, a man of few words, kept the surgical instruments coming, anticipating what was needed next and when it appeared he was stumped looking for a unique instrument, found one that was suitable every, single time.

We concluded our time at Clinica Ezell Hospital, this placed some call a spiritual oasis, with a time of sharing on Thursday evening. Laughter was abundant and stories aplenty; tears flowed freely and our hearts were filled.

In the land of eternal Spring, we sought to glorify our eternal Father with our first surgical team in 2023. I believe we were successful...it 'just means more.'
